THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF

ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

OBJECTS.

- 1.—Federation. To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—Recognition.—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualifications for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing. To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—Reform. To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the conditions of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
 - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
 - (b) Performing members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
 - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. 0d.; or 2s. 6d. a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1s. 6d. a year.
 - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5s.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held after Easter Day at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmunds alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
 - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
 - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
 - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
 - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.
- N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary (or Captain, or Ringing Master), who shall collect all Subscriptions as soon after January 1st as possible, and send them to the District Secretary.
- 6.—This Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Change Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the Rules and decisions thereof.

RULES.

- 1.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1s. in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1s. 0d. per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper, and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before January 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a Company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting or at each Branch or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.

THE SUFFOLK GUILD.

Report for 1934.

The past year has not been an eventful one for Ringers. Finances have for the present ceased to trouble the Guild, although it is hoped that all members will pay their subscriptions each January.

Kelsale tower is now repaired and open for ringing once more, and a new band is under instruction. When this band has been built up again, we may hope that they will be able to equal the record of the famous band once in that village, all of whom have left us, during the period when the bells were not available.

Ufford, All Saints Sudbury, and Saxmundham, are still in the condition of hope deferred. May they ring again while the ringers are still alive.

The pre-reformation ring of five at St. Lawrence, Ipswich, are now in good order again, and are being rung in Changes; and the poor bell in the ring at Bardwell is being recast in our local Foundry.

The annoyance caused by noisy bells is giving the Guild some anxiety. Now that it is known how to obviate this at very little expense, there is no excuse for the annoyance being continued anywhere.

Secretary's Report for 1935.

There has always been a demand for a Report that would be published in the early part of the year, instead of July or later. To have done so in two successive years would have meant leaving only six months between two issues. The cost alone of this would have made it impossible. The alternative is to have a double number, really covering 18 months. This is what we have now done, and if there are any members who have not yet paid for last year, will they please pay for the two years together, to cover the cost of this Report.

It will be seen that our numbers have gone up, and that at 1,011, they are again over the thousand names.

During the year, the rings at Stoke-by-Clare and Hinderclay have been re-hung, and now go well with new bands to ring them. At Stoke-by-Clare, it is due to the generosity and keenness of the Rev. E. W. Carpenter, who has retired and settled there, and rings regularly, that both bells and ringers are in good trim. The ring at Bardwell has also been attended to, and the faulty bell recast. The Ufford bells are now at Loughborough, and we hope soon to have peals rung again. If we can help to have the eight at Horham rehung, we will.

In revising the Directory of Towers at the end of this Report, we are struck with the many omissions. Will every one who reads this please turn up their tower, and any other they know about, and send me at once any corrections needed there, and in the list of members?

I say, "at once," as this is perhaps the last thing I can do, as Secretary of the Guild. If any of you are at all grateful for the work I have done for the Guild during the 14 years of its existence, will you please send me a little towards our re-hanging at Ufford. We are very grateful for those who have already sent; but if each tower to which this report goes, were to send one shilling, something could be done which would commemorate the Guild here.

Ringing Master's Report.

The peals recorded for the Guild in the two years 1934-35 numbered 167, in 1934-78 being run, and 89 in 1935. For purposes of comparison the following table gives the totals on various numbers for the past three years.

A glance at this will reveal a rather surprising drop of 12 in Major peals in 1934, which has been almost recovered the next year. It also indicates that there is a revival in Minor ringing, which is in fact the case, as our records show more bands are ringing peals. This revival is particularly welcome, as it can scarcely be doubted that six bell ringing is the foundation of all ringing.

We maintain our reputation for variety, the Surprise group seeming to be the most favoured. Of these methods on eight bells, we recorded 42 in fifteen different methods, eight of them being rung for the first time by the enterprising Helmingham band. This band has now rung peals in more than thirty different Surprise methods. Included in the peals of Minor were twelve in 7 methods—always a good performance. The Ipswich St. Mary-le-Tower band continues to give a lead to the ringing

fraternity in Maximus ringing, and three peals of Rochester are recorded, the first of Surprise Maximus ever rung in an extending lead method. Other notable peals are the 10,368 of Kent Treble Bob Major at Horringer, the longest peal yet rung for the Guild; the Symonds' "name" peal at Stowmarket, and the peal at Woodbridge on His late Majesty's Jubilee Day, the only peal completed in the county on that day, this peal is also remarkable for the number of "firsts" in it.

Members to the number of 185 took part in the peals, of whom 42 appear as conductors; a remarkable feature being the number ringing either their first peal, or their first in a fresh method, a large proportion of the peals have footnotes indicating this, showing a desire on the part of our members for advancement in the art.

The standard of ringing seems to be well maintained in the county, and many churches have their bells rung regularly for service by members of the Guild; but again I would urge our more experienced ringers to encourage in every way, beginners and learners as they come along, and thus assist in upholding the old East Anglian tradition of change-ringing.
