## Debenham

Regular service and practice ringing has continued throughout the year.

## Framsden

The back 6 of these bells, which are near end of life, and only to be rung occasionally, were rung twice during the year. They were rung in celebration of the coronation and for a benefice service. The ringing was organised by the Debenham ringers.
The BAC are suggesting doing some safety repair work to the floor under the trebles. This should enable all 8 bells to be rung, but will not change the condition of the bells, which will remain at condition 4.

## Helmingham

The 3rd Friday practices have continued over the year and are usually well attended. Debenham Sunday service ringers continue to ring for the monthly service. This is sometimes only on 6 bells due to clashes with other services in the area. They were rung for the coronation, weddings and by visiting bands.

## Winston

Debenham ringers have arranged for these bells to be rung for important services and events, including the coronation, benefice service, and Christmas.

## Barham

## Barking

Barking has had a reasonable year. An extra ringer has been gained for the regular Monday night practices. They are very fortunate to have a young ringer who is developing rapidly, enabling the band to occasionally ring Cambridge and Stedman on practice nights. Sunday service ringing can be a problem due to not being able to find enough ringers but the ellacombe chimes are rung when possible.

## Coddenham

A quarter peal is rung once a month by local band.

## Stonham Aspal

## Area Report for SE District ADM Falkenham/Felixstowe

## David Stanford - Area Report - Clopton, Hasketon, Burgh, Grundisburgh, Woodbridge

## Clopton

There are weekly Friday practices with an average attendance of nine comprising both Clopton tower members and regular visitors. The bells are rung for Sunday service on the 4th Sunday.
Four people were taught to ring during the year all of whom joined the Guild as Clopton tower members. There are no ringers under eighteen years of age.
The bells were rung for the Coronation of King Charles III by Clopton ringers and regular visitors.
A combination of good fortune and foresight resulted in the acquisition of a tower vacuum cleaner and there is optimism that a clean ringing room will ensure good ringing into the future.
Looking ahead the band will progress to simple change ringing and some additional proficient ringers will be helpful to those learning.

## Hasketon

There are no Guild members or ringers associated with Hasketon but a benefice-wide band rang for Sunday services at least once a month with the exception of when the church was not accessible due the installation of a kitchen and toilet. The congregation express their like of the Sunday service ringing and usually ensure a suitable gift of appreciation is given to the ringers at Christmas time.

## Burgh

There are no Guild members or ringers associated with Burgh. A benefice-wide band aim to ring the bells once in the months when there are Sunday services.
The bells were rung for the Coronation of King Charles III in May by ringers from benefice towers.

## Grundisburgh

There are practices most Thursdays with attendance being sporadic but usually sufficient to ring some doubles methods. Some additional regular visitors would help those who currently attend and possibly be a step toward ringing all twelve bells (and ultimately the National Twelve Bell Competition).
The bells are rung weekly for Sunday services when there are typically eight ringers from benefice towers. The bells were rung by ringers from benefice towers to mark Commonwealth Day in March and the Coronation of King Charles III in May.
There are no ringers under the age of eighteen and at this time no learners being taught to handle.

## Woodbridge

Woodbridge has a very loyal band of ringers who ring every Sunday morning for the morning service with attendance being typically ten ringers. Most of the ringing for Sunday services, weddings and special events is
posted on Bellboard. One Sunday in January an entire Woodbridge band of eleven ringers rang before morning Eucharist Service and in May fifteen ringers gathered to ring for the Coronation of King Charles III.
There are no ringers or learners under eighteen years of age.
Two members of the band having completed the Association of Ringing Teachers (ART) module one teacher course are teaching new recruits and working towards ART teacher accreditation.
The band is self-sufficient and progressing but welcomes visitors.
